
Then, facing the Holy Table, the Presider proceeds

To receive a priestly blessing instead, please come forward and cross your arms over your chest.

Our New Priest-In-Charge

After much prayer and discernment The Vestry of St. James' is pleased to announce that The. Rev. Gina Gore has accepted the call to become our Priest-in-Charge.

The Reverend Gina L. Gore is thrilled to be joining St. James' as our new Priest-In-Charge! Her passions include church development and vitality, forming new ministries, and supporting children, youth, and families in faith. She has served on NY diocesan committees for Congregational Development and Church Planting. She began her lay ministry to children in 2009 as a founding member of an Episcopal church plant in Los Angeles called Thad's, followed by serving at Church of The Advent, where she developed interest in multicultural ministries. Once ordained in 2015 she served as Associate Priest and Chaplain for Children, Youth and Family at St. Wilfrid of York in Huntington Beach, CA. Upon moving back to New York City in 2017 she served as a supply priest at St. Thomas Church, and as Priest Associate at St. Luke in the Fields, where she planted Supper Chapel, a Friday night intergenerational service. From 2020-2023 she served as school chaplain for The Cathedral School at St. John the Divine in New York City, a K-8 Episcopal day school, while also continuing as a supply priest in New York and Connecticut. A native of Denver, CO, Rev. Gina holds a Bachelor of Science in Music from University of Colorado, Denver, a certificate of Anglican Studies from Bloy House Episcopal Theological School, and a Master of Divinity from Episcopal Divinity School.

MUSIC NOTES

The POSTLUDE this week is based on the HYMN TUNE of Webb, aptly named after its composer, George James Webb (1803-1887). Webb was an English-American composer. He was born near Salisbury, England and died in Orange, New Jersey, USA. Webb studied organ at Salisbury Cathedral. In 1830 he immigrated to the United States. He was the organist at the Old South Church in Boston for 40 years and edited several hymn books, one being The Massachusetts Collection of Psalmody(1840). Being a Boston area native, I (Joanne) was thrilled to learn this information! You will recognize this tune as it is most often used for the hymn Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus.

The CHANCEL CHOIR ANTHEM "Will You Come and Follow Me" (The Summons) uses the tune of Kelvingrove (a traditional Scottish tune) and the text is by John Bell of the Iona Community. https://iona.org.uk/

The hymn is based on Mark 1:16-20 as Jesus calls some disciples. This hymn was also used at Blackburn Cathedral in 2014 as the Bishop of Blackburn officiated at a 20th anniversary service in commemoration of the first women ordained in the Church of England. There is a lot of interesting information on the Web regarding this hymn and John Bell. I would encourage you to further research!
