From Whom Have You Learned the Love of God?

I am not asking who taught you *about* the love of God. From whom have you learned – felt/experienced/made your own – the Love of God through Jesus?

We celebrate **All Saints Sunday this year on Sunday, November 3.**

Considered a high feast day in our Church calendar, All Saints Day honors and remembers the community of saints, those who have gone before as faithful witnesses of Christ's love. This is also a day recommended for baptisms. What better time to welcome a fellow traveler into a *way of life* than by being witnesses to the power of God's love in our own lives?

Charitable Giving From Your IRA

Giving from your IRA is a smart way to achieve your charitable goals and receive income tax benefits.

Current tax law allows you to donate to your favorite charities, such as St James', directly from your individual retirement account. Here's how: When you reach 70½, you have to take a required minimum distribution (RMD) from your IRA. The withdrawal is counted as taxable income, which may increase your tax bill. If you make a charitable contribution directly from your IRA to St. James, you benefit by reducing your income that is taxed.

This is called a qualified charitable distribution or QCD. You can make distributions in any amount up to \$100,000 each year, and the amount will be excluded from gross income on both your Federal and State tax returns.

QCDs can be made from the following IRAs: Traditional, Rollover, Inherited, SEP (inactive only), and SIMPLE (inactive only). You cannot make a QCD from a 401(k), 403(b) or Keogh plan during your lifetime.

To make a gift to St James' from your IRA, follow these steps:

1. Consider how your required distribution will impact your finances and taxes overall.
2. Contact your IRA trustee to find out more about its process for arranging qualified charitable distributions.
3. Notify the trustee that you want to make a qualified charitable distribution, and fill out the required paperwork from the trustee. Please instruct them to provide your name and address on the QCD paperwork so we can provide the required receipt needed for your taxes.
4. The check should be made to St James Episcopal Church, 25 West Street, Danbury, CT 06810

Giving the Gift of Grace and Dignity: End of Life Planning


Saturday November 2, 9 am - 1 pm in the Parish Hall

We hope all is well with you and your families.

*As most of you know, Daily Bread Food Pantry has been moving forward steadily with an exciting renovation project with grant monies from HUD through the City of Danbury. We are deeply grateful to St. James for welcoming us into the church during this period and are thrilled to report that **our work is almost complete**. Our new space will allow us to better serve thousands of families in need in the Greater Danbury Area.*



Here is some important news: while pantry volunteers have done an amazing job coordinating complex client distributions as well as managing renovation project details over the past couple of months they will not be able to simultaneously plan our annual large-scale Thanksgiving distribution. We will, however, offer special holiday

*non-perishable food items to clients during our regular distributions throughout November. With this in mind, we ask that **St. James parishioners interested in supporting Daily Bread this season consider donating funds instead of turkeys.** Monetary donations will help us purchase food year-round to support our large client base which, in recent months, has grown faster than ever before. Caravan of Faith

Four years ago, parishioner Beth Cox approached PJ Leopold, Executive Director of the Association of Religious Communities (ARC), with an idea to create an interfaith program for adults based on ARC's Peace Camp for kids. Since 2015, 80 people of different faiths have explored the basic tenets of Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Christianity, and Buddhism. A typical evening (held at each place of worship) includes an overview of that faith, a time for questions, refreshments, and a craft. This handmade craft not only symbolizes that faith, but also helps to create a bond among the group, as people relax and chat with each other. The last evening of the program is held at ARC's Interfaith Service, where previous groups have bonded so much that they sit with each other! Buildings & Grounds – Keeping our Space a Sight to Behold

Caring for our buildings and grounds is as much a ministry as any other effort we make to care for the people and resources God has given us. In addition to resurfacing our community prayer boards along West Street with a more durable material, our Buildings and Grounds ministry also has accomplished lots of behind-the-scenes necessities.

- ✓ Worked with the Fire Marshal to inspect the church building and obtain an updated NFPA 72 Fire Alarm Report and a NFPA 25 Sprinkler Test Document. Exit signs and emergency lighting was checked and bulbs and batteries were replaced as needed.
- ✓ In preparation for the new electrical service to the Daily Bread Food Pantry, trees around the utility pole in the parking lot were trimmed; also removed dead trees along our property line with the Danbury Savings Bank.
- ✓ Removed the damaged stucco from the Lounge fireplace chimney; new stucco installed.
- ✓ Replacing boiler in the Old Rectory so that our Sexton has heat this winter.
- ✓ Working with Prism Energy Services to determine financial viability versus energy sustainability costs if we replace the Church steam heating system and add insulation under the roof of Luckenbill Hall.
- ✓ Worked with West Conn. volunteers to spread 2 cubic yards mulch in the planting areas on the East side of the church.
- ✓ Sept. "Work-shirt Saturday" cleared overgrowth on the property on the east side of Luckenbill Hall, cleaned gutters, removed debris from the parking lot storm drain and removed several small trees growing in the planting areas around the Old Rectory.
- ✓ Timers controlling the exterior lights around the church have been replaced as needed and re-calibrated.
- ✓ The boundary line dispute at the Rectory has been resolved.
- ✓ Loose ceiling tiles in the Nursery have been removed and new tile installed.
- ✓ The water-damaged wall below the Ascension Window, behind the Alter is in the process of being repaired.
- ✓ Our Victory Garden gardeners produced another bumper crop of vegetables for the food pantry
- ✓ A new SEED LIBRARY has been added to our library where gardeners can swap all kinds of seeds and techniques

Holy Spirit at ECCT Convention 2019

As witnessed by Mimi Herald, first time delegate

Our Episcopal Church in Connecticut (ECCT) Annual diocesan Convention is far more than strolling through the exhibit tables or following Robert's Rules in doing the people's business for the diocese. Naturally the 8:30am-5:30pm Saturday meeting had a full agenda that exuded a seriousness of purpose, and which was attended to with diligence. However, my day was highlighted by people and the Holy Spirit.

I became acquainted with many new Episcopalians from across our state as I laughed, imagined, sang, dined, prayed and questioned with them, and listened to them. Along the way, I experienced the gift of the Holy Spirit at work!

Early in a breakout session I elected to participate in, around the question of racial healing, justice, and reconciliation, I listened to a woman at my table passionately share her experience being in an ongoing exchange between her parish and a parish with a distinctly different racial makeup within her community. As she expanded on how the two groups have been engaging in various activities at each other's churches and have been building meaningful relationships across differences, I became so connected to her story. I could see myself in it. I was so moved I could see it happening in my community and across our state. I felt as though the Holy Spirit was nudging me, and I quietly became excited to "try it on".

My second encounter with the Holy Spirit came as delegates were presented with the first Resolution, the merger of two parishes. I could appreciate the value of the end product, but I was a bit ignorant to the real trauma of the process. A group of individuals from both parishes gathered up on a dais in the center of the auditorium. After the resolution was introduced, and a representative on stage from each parish said a few

words, a video was broadcast which contained short vignettes of the merger process experienced by parishioners from both churches. It was such a profound experience to see how the two churches have clearly been embraced by the Holy Spirit and lifted up as they meet the challenge of partnering to worship and work in their community.

Wait, what? Again? Yes, the second Resolution was also an equally moving merger of two additional parishes. The Holy Spirit working overtime!

As we completed business on the last of 6 resolutions, Bishop Laura made an impromptu request that we stand and asked for someone to lead us in The Doxology. "Praise God from whom ALL blessings flow." rang out. Within moments I shivered and my eyes welled with tears as the power of the Holy Spirit among us produced a symphony of voices boldly proclaiming this truth throughout the auditorium. The pure grace of God was beheld.

IMMIGRATION. That's a "hot button" topic today. It can trigger thoughts and feelings of compassion and hopelessness as well as anger and frustration. While we may not have a personal story to share, we certainly have thoughts and feelings on this topic. Can we understand the desire immigrants have for a safe, secure life and the loss and risks they are willing to accept to leave their family and homes behind and travel to a new country where the language and customs/traditions are different? Can we imagine the difficulties they will face in this new land?

Ministry Networks are two or more Episcopalians from two or more parishes collaborating together to serve God's mission.

Can we understand the reasons why so many are opposed to immigrants coming to America? Is it because we fear immigrants will take our jobs? Do we fear they might change our culture because they are different from us? Do we worry about gangs coming to our neighborhoods, bringing drugs and crime with them? Do we oppose them simply for the color of their skin?

Regardless of your position on immigration, it's important that we have all the facts and that we feel safe when discussing this topic. Our information must be accurate and current when we share our thoughts and ideas with each other. Feeling safe in our discussions allows us to speak through our hearts and listen with our ears, hearts and minds. This enables us to differ with love for each other. Only then can we begin to find solutions to this serious issue.

A group of concerned Episcopalians in Connecticut have formed a ministry network. They call themselves: "***Let My People Go***" from the time when the U.S. government began separating children from their parents at our southern border. ***This group's mission is to raise awareness throughout Connecticut on the plight of immigrants and raise money to provide legal support undocumented children need when they arrive.*** They provide current, accurate information on immigration by listing organizations that assist undocumented immigrants when they arrive at our borders. This list also includes where to find historical information and statistics in the U.S. as well as reading materials on immigrant stories and struggles to find a better life than what they left behind. We invite you to review the brochure identifying agencies and immigration policies which is posted on the Mission bulletin board in our parish hall.



Let My People Go staffed a booth at the annual convention on Oct. 26-27 and set up a computer whereby people could donate to the Refugee and Immigrant Center for Education and Legal Services (RAICES) to help immigrant children and youth.

A life-sized display of the immigrant "journey" at Convention allowed us to get a glimpse of the hazards of their dangerous trip to the U.S.

"Participating in God’s mission" looks different in different places, and different times, and with different people. Wherever, and whenever, the restoring, reconciling love of God in Christ through the Holy Spirit breaks into the world to “make all things new”, there is God’s mission. These stories give us a glimpse into what it looks like to join God in what God is up to in the world around us.

We participate by learning what God is already up to, and joining *that*.

1. We read the Bible to see what God has done, and continues to do.
2. We talk to neighbors and leaders and others. We might convene a meeting, walk around the neighborhood, hop on a bus, host a supper, or whatever works in that context.
3. We take stock of our gifts and talents, in light of what we've learned.
4. We go out from where we are to join God's mission, reflect on that, and keep doing it.

New Rector Recruitment Team Update

The Recruitment Team began meeting in late September and will continue to meet over the next couple of months. Building off the work from the Discernment Team, our initial meetings focus on identifying and confirming what we are seeking in a new rector and expectations of the individual in the role. We also are determining questions that we will ask our candidates.

If you are not already aware, the position for our rector has been posted since last month and will be open to applicants until October 31st. ***As of this writing, our Bishop of Record, Ian Douglas, and our Diocesan Canon for Transition Ministry, Lee Ann Tolzman, have received and vetted 4 four names and expect another 2-3 to be received before the closing date.*** (21st century reality check – one of the ongoing changes facing all institutional religions is that fewer clergy are willing to move these days because of dual career marriages and children in schools).

And so we If you have not recently visited our website, we would encourage to view the updates to see what interested candidates will view should they wish to learn more about our congregation with highlights of our many ministries, presence in the

community and other key aspects of St. James'. Once the application period has closed, Lee Ann will meet with the team (scheduled for November 7) to review the candidate pool. The team will review the list of candidates and plan a first round of interviews for the middle of the month. Based on the number of candidates, a second round of interviews would occur in early December for final recommendations to be presented to the Vestry in January.

In the meantime, our Interim, Rev. Lisa, has been charged with helping the Vestry develop mutual ministry goals for parish and Vestry to present to each candidate in the final interview. These goals, based on all of the work and conversations we have had over the past twelve months, will help establish expectations, hopes, and dreams for our new journey together.


